

## Surrey & North West Sussex Area Prescribing Committee (APC)

Policy Statement	Minocycline for Acne
Policy No:	APC 441-2019
Date of Issue	August 2019
Review Date:	August 2022 (Unless new published evidence becomes available before this date OR there is new published national guidance e.g. NICE)

## **Recommendations:**

The Area Prescribing Committee does not recommend the use of minocycline for acne.

Minocycline will be considered BLACK on the traffic light system for the use in acne. Prescribers should:

- NOT initiate minocycline for any new patient with acne AND
- Switch patients taking minocycline for acne to an alternative in line with NICE guidance

## **Key Considerations:**

- Acne vulgaris NICE CKS advises Minocycline is not recommended for use in acne as it is associated with an increased risk of adverse effects such as drug induced lupus, skin pigmentation and hepatitis.
- A PrescQIPP CIC review found there is no evidence to support the use of one tetracycline over another in terms of efficacy for the treatment of acne vulgaris and alternative once daily products are available.
